This month's message is the text of my presentation, although, I wrote it only for backup purposes. What is written is not what I spoke.

The event finished as planned around 7 PM, but the clean-up crew, Elissa Kahn, the Blotckys, the Sterns and Rahel, continued to schmooze until past 9PM.

I want to especially acknowledge Roberta Pavoll, without whom this event might never have happened and as I said at the event: I look forward to sharing many more years and simchas in the years to come.

History of Betenu

December 2008 - 25th Anniversary of the Founding of Betenu Congregation Betenu, Nashua, NH

The start of Betenu meant that the temple needed a name. The word Betenu means both "Our house" and "Our temple". The founders hoped that those who joined Betenu would feel both the hominess of Betenu as well as the more solemn aspect of being a temple. On November 4, 1983, the document of incorporation was signed. It required five signatures. The five were Diane Levine, Valerie Segal, Joshua Segal, Arthur Siegel and Lois Siegel.

Once an organization was formed, we needed to have a constitution and by-laws. The committee that assembled those was headed by Debbie Pignatelli, who has become a state-wide political force, but also, nolonger a member.

From November of 1983 thru March 1984, the only official Betenu events were a monthly Kiddush for the Jewish residents of Greenbriar Nursing Home. The only remaining Betenu people who were participants back then were Sanders and Rowena Burstein. Betenu's first service was held on April 6, 1984 at the Main Street Methodist Church, which, with minor exceptions, was our place of worship until spring of 1992. Betenu will be eternally grateful to the Main Street Methodist Church and its minister at the time, Reverend Ralph Bruce, for their hospitality over those years.

In spring of 1984, Betenu had a charter member drive which yielded 27 families. Parts of 5 families are still with Betenu. Betenu members are highly mobile. Most of the turn over in membership has occurred through relocation or divorce. However, there have been a few who have left for philosophical differences and a few who joined and remained members, only until the last of their children finished their education.

The first High Holydays at Betenu were held in the fall of 1984 in the Greenbriar Nursing Home. I was still serving in Keene. Betenu's lay leadership including David Grinstein, Christina Grinstein and Marian Weisenfeld led services that year. (Continued on page 2)



RABBI'S MESSAGE (continued):

No aspect of our synagogue is more important than Jewish continuity. The education that we pass to the next generation is the single most important thing a congregation does. When Betenu's religious school opened in the fall of 1984, there were about 25 children in three classes that met in Rabbi Segal's home. The staff was Teri Ruby, Suretta Williams and Valerie Segal.

From, 1986 to 1987 the religious school met in an office condo on West Hollis, courtesy of Drs. Larry Learner and Michael Rosenfeld. From 1987 to 1991, the school rented space in the "Adult Learning Center".

In 1990, Betenu began looking for the "right building." Many contributed to the efforts that culminated in the acquisition of this facility, but the dedicated leadership of Geoffrey Gross was the catalyst that made it happen. It was a real credit to the membership who banded together in the absence of any single large donor.

Philosophically, Betenu is "main stream reform", sometimes referred to as traditional reform or modern reform. For those who are not sure what that means, Reform is based on the concept that God gave us two kinds of commandments. One set was ethical and it applies for all time. The other set of commandments were ritual and intended for the people living then. Many reform Jews choose to observe some or all of the ritual commandments, because they add meaning to our lives. The rituals build bridges with other Jews, our ancestors and our extended families. In 2001, Betenu formalized the commitment to Reform Judaism by joining the UAHC, now the URJ.

Betenu also has accommodation for Reconstructionism. Reconstructionism grew out of Conservative Judaism in the 1930's. Like Reform Judaism, ritual commandments are by personal informed choice. However, while the informed reform Jew chooses because a commandment adds existential meaning to his/her life, the informed Reconstructionist says, I will reconstruct new reasons for the old commandments because they have kept Jews from assimilating.

Betenu's religious school is pre-school through post-Bar/Bat Mitsvah. To be considered for Bar or Bat Mitsvah, children must agree to complete a post-Bar/Bat Mitsvah education requirement. One measure of a congregation's success and a Jewish school's success is how many of its members and grads result in another generation of Jews.

However, another measure of interest is that almost 20% of the Betenu grads have reported that they have taken one or more courses in college on Hebrew, Judaica or Jewish History. One Betenu alumnus, Mark Popovsky is now Rabbi Popovsky. Some have suggested that part of what motivaties our alumni in that direction came from what they got from Betenu.

Educationally, Betenu people are very degree-ed. About 75% of the membership is involved in high-tech or the medical field. Best estimates indicate that the average Betenu adult has a Masters Degree.

The future of Betenu is on solid ground with quality and dedicated leadership of our board of directors...

The worst reasons for not joining Betenu:

- I saw your wife in the mall on Shabbat!
- When we were meeting in the Main Street Methodist Church, and having religious school at the Adult Learning Center, both within a mile of Temple Beth Abraham, a potential member from Hudson said that her family was joining TBA because it was closer to them.


