RABBI'S MESSAGE: CHANUKA, CHINUCH AND EDUCATION

Most Hebrew words have a three-letter root. The root for Chanuka is the same root as Chinuch or education. In English there is little similarity between the verb, "to learn" and the verb "to teach". In Hebrew, both are based on Lamed, mem, daled. Lo-meid, to learn – me-la-meid, to teach or in understanding the underlying concept of Hebrew verbs, "to cause to learn".

The fact is, teachers don't teach. The best that a good teacher can do is to facilitate learning. I had a professor at seminary who used to tell a story about being asked at a cocktail party, "What do you do for a living?". He responded, "I am a teacher." When asked, "What do you teach?" he replied, "I teach students. If I have no students, I teach Bible."

I want to thank our teaching staff, Rahel, Sonia, Sandra, Nina and Rachel. The commitment of these people to be there 30-Sundays per year at salaries that are only a bit better than a stipend is a tribute to their commitment to make our school work.

They face the struggle of dealing with absenteeism caused by issues other than health, students who don't do homework, parents who balk at some of the most simple requirements, to name a few.

Sheryl Liberman has been acting VP of Education and has done a wonderful job of coordinating the interface between the Executive Board and the Religious School.

At this season of Chanuka/Chinuch, happy Chanuka greetings are certainly appropriate, but next Sunday, take a moment to say thanks to our teaching staff.

HANUKKA CANDLES From Israel Postal Authority Bulletin

The Hanukka Festival commemorates the dedication of the Holy Temple following the victory of the Jews over the Greek Syrian forces, lead by Antiochus Epiphenes, in the year 164 BCE. During Antiochus' rule, the Jews were forbidden to keep their religious laws and were forced to practice idolatry. The Holy Temple was desecrated by idol worshipping. The Jewish rebellion was led by Matityahu the Hasmonean and his sons, with Yehuda HaMaccabee at the head. They liberated and purified the Temple. Tradition tells that the candles were rekindled by one small jug of oil which had not been rendered impure by the Greeks. The miracle of Hanukka is that the jug was miraculously refilled so that the oil lasted for eight days. It is customary to light an additional Hanukka candle on an eight-branched Hanukka lamp, for each evening of the eight day Festival. An additional ninth candle is called Shamash and is used to light the other eight candles. The Shamash is in the center or on the side of the Hanukka lamp.

This series of Hanukka stamps, designed by Igal Gabay, comprises eight stamps representing the eight days of the festival. The stamps depict objects associated with Hanukka and on the right side of each stamp is an illustration of a Hauukka lamp with candles — an additional lighted candle is shown to represent each day of the Festival.



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The stamp showing the First Candles was issued on December 9,1993. It illustrates an Oil Lamp from the Talmudic Period that is at the Reuben and Edith Hecht Museum at the University of Haifa. This lamp, made of Clay, is decorated with a seven-branched menorah.

The stamp showing the Second Candle was also issued on December 9,1993. It illustrates a lamp carved in stone and is the work of a Yemenite artist who lived in Jerusalem. It is in the shape of a building which recalls Yemenite Architecture and is now in Jerusalem at the Israel Museum.





The stamp showing the Third Candle was also issued On December 9,1993. Lighting the Hanukka lamp From the Rothschild Miscellany, Northern Italy, c.1470 and is now in the Israel Museum in Jerusalem. The Rothschild Miscellany is one of the finest Hebrew Illuminated manuscripts. The pages are richly decorated with colorful paintings and gold leaf.

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The stamp showing the Fourth Candle was issued on November 27,1994. It illustrates the Hanukka Lamp from Mazagan, Morocco and is also in the Israel Museum in Jerusalem. The lamp was made from available materials -A sardine can, pieces of cloth, and slivers of glass. The Lamp reflects the practice of converting every day objects Into ritual artefacts.





The stamp showing the Fifth Candle was issued on December 14,1995. It depicts a Folding Hanukka Lamp from the Lodz Ghetto in Poland C.1944. It is Now at Yad Vashem, Jerusalem. The minature lamp Was crafted in silver in the Lodz Ghetto and was dedicated to Mordechai Chaim Rumkowski, whom the Germans had chosen to head the "Judenrat" - the Jewish Council. When folded the lamp looks like a Closed book

The stamp showing the Sixth Candle was issued on December 23,1997. A coin from the Bar-Kokhba War (132-135 CE) is shown. It is at the Israel Museum in Jerusalem. During the war led by Bar Kokhba against the Romans, coins were issued which were overstruck on Contemporary currency to demonstrate sovereignty. Most Of the emblems on these coins express the aspirations of the Jewish people to rebuild the Holy Temple . The coin which appears on the stamp shows a jug which some scholars believe was an oilvessel and thus the connection to Hanukka.





The stamp showing the Seventh Candle was issued on December 23,1997. It depicts the Spinning-top "Bezalel". It is in the Eretz Israel Museum in Tel Aviv. It is customary, while the Hanukka Candles are burning, to give children a spinning top to amuse them. The initials on the top stand for a phrase in Hebrew indicating "a great miracle happened here which refers to the miracle of the Hanukka.

The stamp showing the Eighth Candle was issued on December 1,1998. This Hanukka Lamp is in the Israel Museum in Jerusalem. The motif on this lamp was Taken from a 19th century sculpture of Matityahu the Hasmonean by Boris Schatz, founder of the Bezalel Art Academy in Jerusalem.





CHANUKAH LIGHTING THE CANDLES

On the first night, you light only the shamus and one Chanukah candle. By the eighth night, you light all of the candles. Candles should be added to the menorah from right to left (like Hebrew writing). The shamus candle is lit first. While holding the shamus candle, recite the following blessings. After reciting the blessings, use the shamus to light the Chanukah candles from left to right (newest to oldest). Candles should be left burning until they go out on their own. They must burn for more than half an hour.

BLESSINGS OVER THE CANDLES

(Each night) Barukh atah Adonai, Eloheinu, melekh ha'olam asher kideshanu b'mitz'votav v'tzivanu l'had'lik neir shel Chanukah. (Amein)

Blessed are you, Eternal our God, sovereign of the universe who has sanctified us with God's commandments and commanded us to kindle the lights of Chanukah. (Amen)

(Each night) Barukh atah Adonai, Eloheinu, melekh ha'olam she'asah nisim la'avoteinu bayamim haheim baziman hazeh. (Amein)

Blessed are you, Eternal our God, sovereign of the universe who performed miracles for our ancestors in those days at this time. (Amen)

(On the first night only) Barukh atah Adonai, Eloheinu, melekh ha'olam shehecheyanu v'kiyimanu v'higi'anu laz'man hazeh. (Amein)

Blessed are you, Eternal our God, sovereign of the universe who has kept us alive, sustained us, and enabled us to reach this season. (Amen)

INSIDE TERRORISM; THE X-RAY PROJECT Thursday, January 13, 2011 @ 7:00pm

Inside Terrorism (www.x-rayproject.com) is a photography exhibit which uses actual x-rays and CT scans from the two largest hospitals in Jerusalem to explore the most important social issues of our time: the effects of terrorism on a civilian population.

Diane Covert: The idea for *Inside Terrorism* began to coalesce in my mind in 2002 as a personal response to terrorism and to my discomfort with the way terrorism has been justified in some circles. This is a documentary of survivors of terrorism. Much like photographer Mathew Brady documented the Civil War; people in emergency rooms today are documenting the effects of terrorism. The exhibit is another form of "straight" photography - that is photographs made with an unaltered spectrum of light. With that technology, we are able to look inside terrorism.

Apart from the relentless need to see reality, artists also want to comment upon it. The X-rays and CT scans in this exhibit are new ways to make figurative images and portraits. They represent life in the modern cross-section of these artistic traditions – both the desire to observe and describe reality with the most modern techniques available, and the need to think and talk about it.





Tikkun; An Ancient Healing Art

Three thousand years ago we instinctively knew the power of music and the Hebrew word of G-d. Music was often used to provide invaluable help in ancient times and it still proves effective today. He would continue his studies even as the first light of dawn appeared in the sky." (Rabbi Shim'on Hasida, Talmud Tractate Berachot 3.b.)

"And it came to pass, that whenever the spirit of melancholy from G-d was upon Saul, David would take the harp and play it with his hand, and Saul would feel relieved and it would be well with him, and the evil spirit would depart from Saul." (Samuel 16:14-23)
