
This Generation's Tabernacle

IN THIS WEEK'S *parashah*, the selection we read from Torah each week, we are transported with the children of Israel into one of our mythical narrative's most pivotal scenes: Enveloped in the clouds hovering atop Mount Sinai, having just received revelation and with the Ten Commandments in hand, Moses receives a prophecy from God detailing how the ancient Israelites are to build the *mishkan*—the Tabernacle—a portable home and dwelling place for the Divine presence. Positioned always at the center of the wandering Israelite community, the Tabernacle holds the tablets inscribed with God's commandments and serves as God's home here on earth.

The medieval commentator Rashi explains that the specific blueprint of this original Tabernacle should be reconstructed and recreated forever into the future—*v'chen ta'asu l'dorot*—and so you shall make it [like this] forever. Every time we Jews construct a new home for God, Rashi says, it should be built using the exact design Moses received at Revelation, nail by nail, screw by screw. Rashi's pesky grandchildren—the Tosefot, commentators in their own right—raise a difficulty. When Solomon built the temple some 300 years later, the design was totally different, the blueprint altogether new. How can this be?

Levi Yitzchok of Berditchev, rabbi and Jewish leader in 18th century Ukraine, reads it this way: All the measurements and the exact blueprint of the *mishkan* are physical



trappings like the garments of the Holy Spirit. These specific garments are a direct response not only to the prophecy that Moses saw on Mount Sinai, but to the prophecy the entire generation of Israel saw there. Just as no two prophets prophesy exactly alike, no two generations build God's house exactly alike.

The Kedushat Levi, as he is often referred, rereads Rashi's "*l'dorot/forever*" as "*l'dorot/in every generation*." That is, each generation should build their version of the *beit ha'mikdash*—their Temple—according to their context, their needs, and that specific moment. There is not one design forever, but rather, each generation should build their temples, their homes for God, according to their particular prophecy.

BETENU IS IN a moment of significant transition. To grow, to sustain, and to thrive moving forward, we must support a new generation of leadership from within.

Religious school parents and younger families, you are the

new generation of Betenu. For this community to begin a new and generative life-cycle, it is up to you to step into leadership positions and begin to shape Betenu according to your unique and empowered vision. With the wisdom and experience of the founding and early generations to guide us, we must ask ourselves: What is the blueprint that will guide this new iteration of Betenu? What is this particular moment asking of us?

ONCE WE'VE BEGUN to craft this vision, we get to ask: How do we get there? Until then, it is up to us to listen closely to each other and that voice within; to share bravely that which draws us in, makes us curious, and inspires both action and asking within us; and of course, to dream big.

Here's to constructing this generation's Tabernacle that we call Betenu, together. Please be in touch if this visioning process speaks to you and is something you want to get involved in, and we will begin to dream together!
